


Reflections on 2020

"We also have to consider that sexual harassment, exploitation, and assault not only happen on the streets, they also occur in the home and in the detention center.

In other words, black women are often targets of violence inside homes and in private spaces where people cannot easily see them or galvanize around them."

Research - How do we include black women's voices?

Anyone can experience intimate partner violence regardless of their gender, race, age, or ability.

However, it is well known that black and minoritised women can experience increased risks of abuse due to entrenched systems of discrimination and barriers to accessing care and support some of which include, language differences, concerns about confidentiality, and cultural stigmas.




Representation - How are black women represented?

There are a range of stereotypes that provide unhelpful representations of the black woman

The Mammy who is a caregiver for everyone but herself.



The Angry black woman who is badtempered, hostile, and overly aggressive.







Rights - How are black women being protected?

The Ripple Effect: Covid-19 and the Epidemic of Online Abuse found that Black and minoritised women were more likely to have experienced an increase in online abuse, were more likely to modify their behaviours as a result and were more likely to feel like their complaints had not been addressed.

The government needs to implement a comprehensive public health approach to tackling online abuse.





Resource - What opportunities do black women have to access care?

Online Safe Spaces - provides a series of untraceable web pages with information on specialist domestic abuse support services, national helplines, and other resources.

Safe Spaces - which works in partnership with Boots UK, Superdrug pharmacies, Morrison's pharmacies, and independent pharmacies across the country to provide Safe Spaces in their consultation rooms for people experiencing domestic abuse.
